In 1976 the Pauline Memorial AME Zion Church, was nearly destroyed by arson. Because of this event, Dorothy Patch, long time school teacher and community activist and Rev. Nellie Thompson, founder of the Pauline Memorial AME Zion Church, began to work together to find ways to change Salem's racial climate. These two pioneers in racial diversity have lifted a strong voice for racial justice and equality in Salem.

Motivated by their courage and leadership, the Nellie Thompson-Dorothy Patch Scholarship Fund was established in 1995 to help students of racial and/or ethnic origin in Salem achieve their dreams.
