As a Native American student, she has a dream to "serve, advocate, and encourage those who feel like they are trapped."

Zena knows what it is like to feel trapped. She and her five siblings were placed in foster care at a young age.

## Zena wants to do better!

She wants to help protect the natural world that provided comfort for her and knows that education is the key to create the opportunity.

With the help of a \$1,500 scholarship from the Thompson-Patch Scholarship Fund, Zena enrolled in Oregon State University. It's hard to balance school, and work but she is on track to achieve a



science education to prepare her for a career in conservation.
