I tutor kids, read, but don't have much time for that while in school, and to relieve stress I cook and clean. A favorite memory is hiking in Silver Creek Falls State Park and seeing all the waterfalls.

What are your plans after graduation?

I plan to go to graduate school but also need to work to help my family and community.

What activities are you in at PSU?

I helped at the school food pantry pre COVID and am now a peer mentor through TRIO.

What would you like people to know about you and your family?

I was born in a refugee camp in Ethiopia and have been in this country for only 10 years. I am the first female of my family to go to college. I want to set an example for my brothers and sisters and my community.

What advice to you have for students who are graduating from High School?

Don't be afraid, there are people and programs available to help you. Apply for scholarships, talk to people in your classes and others. Learn about resources that are available. While it may be hard and intimidating, it is worth extending yourself.
